INTRODUCTION

What is the Schools Recycle Right Challenge?

The Schools Recycle Right Challenge (SRRC) is an initiative that brings together a wide range of recycling themed activities, lesson plans, supporting resources, and events ideas that have been developed specifically for Australian schools.



Register your school to participate in the challenge at **schoolsrecycle.planetark.org/involved.** Registering will give your school access to all our free resources ready to download. It also adds your schools' work to the national tally!

The SRRC runs from early October through to the last Friday of National Recycling Week (visit the SRRC website for specific dates). Schools can participate as much or as little as they like, choosing activities, lessons, events and dates that suit their needs. The Challenge is designed to be flexible within the school term and caters for all ages and available time.

Choosing a date

National Recycling Week, established by Planet Ark in 1996, is held every year during the second week of November.

The period of the SRRC captures the lead up to National Recycling Week. During this time Planet Ark will be running a nationwide media campaign encouraging schools, councils and businesses to promote recycling through a variety of resources, events and activities. Schools can participate at any time during the period of the challenge and your school may also choose to get involved with activities run by your local council.

Start a new recycling system

Whether you're starting from scratch or building upon previous work, there's a long list of items you can recycle with your students. Schools are great places to set up recycling collections for a range of items including:

- Canteen and lunch box items,
- Printer cartridges through 'Cartridges 4 Planet Ark'
- Mobile phones through 'MobileMuster'
- Batteries
- Books
- Eligible CDS containers
