### HANDS-ON ACTIVITIES

Ideas for practical activities to teach people how to save resources from landfill by reusing, selling, swapping and reducing consumption of new products.



# UPCYCLING WORKSHOP

Use whatever skills you have to hold an upcycling workshop. You could paint cans and turn them into plant pots, use leftover fabric to make cushion filling, make art out of broken items or coffee tables from old tyres, the sky is the limit! A quick google search of 'upcycling ideas' will inspire you to upcycle things you didn't know you could.

What's better than buying second-hand? Swapping things you don't want anymore for other people's treasures! You only need a table (or a couple) where people can place the things they would like to swap and pick something in return.

# FURNITURE RECYCLING

A great way to keep furniture out of landfill is to 'flip' pieces you either have at home, or get from online marketplaces for very cheap or even free! With some TLC, it will look brand new! There are many tutorials on YouTube on how to flip many pieces of furniture.

Repair cafés are becoming more and more popular. They can help you fix broken items such as bikes, electrical appliances and electronics. Consider creating your own pop-up repair café during National Recycling Week, or google search for one near you to fix any broken items you might have. Don't toss it, fix it!

### ZERO/LOW WASTE HACKS

Host a zero/low waste workshop to provide people with easy solutions to common problems or wasteful products. You could explain the benefits of reusable alternatives to single-use items such as beeswax reusable wraps, and reusable coffee cups and cutlery. If you're a good cook, a cooking lesson with leftovers is a great way to reduce food waste.

Are you good at composting or worm farming? Why not share your knowledge? These solutions to food waste are one of the best ways people can reduce their carbon footprint. This can be delivered as a workshop or if you want to learn, look for a community garden!

# COMMUNITY RECYCLING CENTRE TOURS

If you're a council or community group, organise a tour of your local community recycling centre to engage your community in recycling education. Learn about the value of resources and the jobs that are created by doing the right thing at the bin. It is also a great way for people to understand the processes for recycling non-packaging items such as mattresses, paint, and masonry.

Find out how your waste is sorted! Material Recovery Facility (MRF) tours will teach people why it's important to focus on quality rather than quantity when it comes to recycling. Go behind-the scenes to see the journey your recycling takes beyond the bin, and what happens when we put non-recyclable items like soft plastics in the recycling bin. Check our events guide to see if any MRF in your area are hosting a site tour, or ask your local council if they have any planned.
